

Researching Colleges TipSheet

Ask the right questions. Best info at your fingertips.

ObiCoach will guide you to the best resources to develop your college list:

- Go to the website of a college on your list. See a **virtual tour** on the website? Or, try touring via these websites: 1) http://obi.coach/rc6 (a series of photos that you can explore in 360 degrees), and 2) http://obi.coach/rc7 (short video of a school).
- Check out the majors at that school. How difficult is it to change majors? Do the classes look interesting to you? Do they have your back-up major if you change your mind? What are the general education requirements? Do you get automatic entry into your major or do you need to have a certain college GPA to be able to declare? Check out what kind of research and/or cutting edge technology they have there. What are the profs and students in your major researching? Does it look interesting to you?
- What are your passions . . . activities outside of the classroom? What do you want to make sure is part of your college experience? Look into their programs like **clubs, honors college** and **study abroad**?
- Look at **housing** options. Do most freshmen live on campus? Is housing guaranteed for 1,2, . . 4 years? Is on-campus living required for XX years? Do students live in singles, doubles, triples? Single-sex living, or coed by room or by floor? Are there living learning communities?
- Go to the Niche.com website and type in the college name. Look through the sections listed below.
 - o **Report Card**: Click on gray "View Full Report Card" for grades in various categories. Click on a category for more info, "location" to learn more about weather, access to restaurants, outdoor activities, etc.
 - o **College Rankings**: At bottom of this section, click on blue "See all College Rankings". *Note any high rankings*=strengths of that school or *very low rankings*=maybe something to look into, could be weakness of that school. For specific majors, such as "Best schools for chemistry", click on "ranking factors".
 - o **Academics:** Scroll down to the Academics box. Check out the <u>professors rating</u>. Look at "% of students that say it is <u>easy to get the classes</u> that you want". Next, click on "Read More About Academics" to see the <u>graduation rate</u> and retention rate.
 - o **Students**: Read the poll info. Then click on "Read More About the Students" to see <u>political</u> leanings on campus, ethnic breakdown.
 - o **Campus life** (click to open up): Scroll down for: <u>dorms</u>, <u>food</u>, how popular are <u>varsity sports</u>, what are the favorite campus events.
 - o **College Reviews:** see **comments from actual students** on their experiences. Read through a bunch of those. Click "categories" on left to find comments on specific areas like housing, academics or food.
